Subject: Report to the University Council

I want to begin by offering a brief update on the work of the Red and Blue Advisory Committee and the Tomorrow, Together strategic planning process. To date, the Committee has hosted more than 30 consultative meetings with various faculty, student, and staff groups. These have been uniformly well-received and interactive. The Committee also recently hosted 3 open forums, one each for faculty, students, and staff. The Tomorrow, Together webpage has generated around 300 comments so far. The Committee has also sent out more than 40 surveys to the Schools and Centers.

The Committee is carefully reviewing all of this data and information with the goal of providing recommendations to me about our future strategic priorities. This important work remains ongoing, and I will share updates with Council as the process continues. I also encourage anyone who has not yet shared their ideas with the Committee in person or through the webpage to do so.

Earlier this month, I joined Penn Trustee Emeritus Roy Vagelos, Deans Fluharty and Kumar, Dr. Karen Goldberg, VIPER students, faculty, and staff for a topping off ceremony for Penn's new Vagelos Laboratory for Energy Science and Technology. The construction of this advanced facility is yet another sign of Penn's rise as a global leader for energy science. Humanity stands at the threshold of profound changes in how we create and consume energy. But we aren't there yet. What's needed now are interdisciplinary expertise, inventive spirit, and urgent drive—distinctive Penn strengths that the Vagelos Laboratory will help amplify. We are deeply grateful for Diana and Roy Vagelos's generosity and their decades-long commitment to our University.

Last month, we announced that our Vice President for University Communications, Steve MacCarthy, will retire at the end of June after 12 years at Penn. Steve's decision to retire is an ideal occasion to recognize his many accomplishments. Since arriving on campus in 2011, Steve has been a transformative Penn leader, an invaluable advisor to my predecessors and to me, and an extraordinary colleague and friend to people across campus and beyond. During the worst of the pandemic, Steve provided deft, strategic, and compassionate counsel for keeping the University community informed, safe, and operative across all our academic missions. He leaves some very big shoes to fill. To help fill them, we've retained the services of Korn Ferry and have launched a global search for Penn's next VP for University Communications.

I'll close by noting one batch of recent faculty honors among many—far too many to list here. Hat's off to Penn's newest fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science—eight faculty in all representing SAS, Engineering, Perelman, and Penn Vet. Congratulations to William Beltran, Brian Gregory, Insup Lee, Guo-li Ming, Eric Schelter, Theodore Schurr, Warren Seider, and Karen Winey.

PROVOST'S STATUS REPORT

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It was a great pleasure to welcome Sarath Pillai as the first representative of postdocs to Council at our meeting on February 1. I am very pleased to confirm that we are opening a dedicated Office of Postdoctoral Affairs this semester. The official opening will be next month, and we will have much more information about it as the date gets closer. This new office, under the leadership of the Senior Vice Provost for Research, will provide targeted support, resources, and community-building for the more than 1300 postdoctoral trainees at Penn. It will serve as a hub for postdocs across all twelve Schools, advancing advocacy, best practices, and equitable experiences for postdocs in the wide range of different academic areas at Penn. The office will encompass new resources, programs, and communications; oversee the highly successful Provost's Postdoctoral Fellowships for Academic Diversity; and provide ongoing support for the Penn Postdoctoral Association, the Biomedical Postdoctoral Council, and the Du Bois Postdoctoral Circle.

I encourage all faculty members to consider applying for a grant from the Excellence Through Diversity Fund, which is now accepting applications through April 15. The Fund provides resources for innovative projects by Penn faculty members (Assistant, Associate, or Full Professors in any track) that advance faculty diversity, equity, and inclusion, especially proposals that seek to improve the recruitment, retention, promotion, and leadership development of faculty members from underrepresented groups and/or improve mentorship and other support for junior and mid-career faculty members from underrepresented groups. In particular, the Fund seeks proposals that promote collaborations across disciplines, departments, and/or Schools and foster new understandings of the structures, policies, and programs that can best advance our shared mission to further faculty diversity, equity, and inclusion at Penn. You can learn more in the full Call for Proposals and address any questions to Connie Chang, Executive Director of Faculty Affairs in the Office of the Provost.

I hope that everyone will have an opportunity to visit the new exhibit at the <u>Arthur Ross Gallery</u>, which spotlights a landmark 1864 painting by Gustave Courbet discovered in 2016 in storage at the School of Dental Medicine, then restored and authenticated through our Penn Art Collection. The Arthur Ross Gallery, like the <u>Institute of Contemporary Art</u>, always offers free admission for all members of our Penn and Philadelphia communities. This truly cross-campus show – cocurated by Lynn Marsden-Atlass, University Curator and Executive Director of the Gallery, and André Dombrowski, Frances Shapiro-Weitzenhoffer Associate Professor of Art History – includes a major <u>scholarly catalogue</u> published by Penn Press with essays by leading global Courbet scholars, as well as public programs and events that include a <u>podcast</u> and a conversation with Jennifer Thompson, Head of the European Painting and Sculpture Department at the Philadelphia Museum of Art.
